


# PRESS KIT 2021 SLOW TOURISM IN THE LOIRE VAILLEY









The Loire Valley offers countless leisure options for lovers of nature, heritage and gastronomy.



To get here, nothing could be simpler:

- from Paris: TGV train to Tours (1hr), regional trains to Chartres (1hr), Orléans (1hr) or Bourges (2hrs)
- from Roissy-CDG airport: direct TGV to Tours (2hrs)
- from Nantes: regional trains to Tours (1hr 45mins), Blois (2hrs 30mins), Orléans (3hrs)



Listed as UNESCO World Heritage since 2000, the Loire Valley is the heart of the surrounding region. Nicknamed the Valley of the Kings, it is home to countless châteaux including fifteen which are listed as "Great Sites of the Loire Valley", like the Château of Chambord and the Château of Chenonceau. Indeed, before Versailles, it was in the Loire Valley that the Kings of France had their residences!

The Loire Valley is also known as the "Garden of France" because of its fertile ground and variety of soil types that are ideal for growing fruit and vegetable and making a wide range of wines. Red, white, rosé, sparkling, dry or tannic... there something for every taste!

There's no better way to discover this region while still preserving its natural beauty than by cycling along *La Loire à Vélo*, a cycle route that follows the Loire, its vineyards and châteaux over 900km!

To the south of the Loire Valley lies Berry, a little-known countryside region dotted with countless gems including small private châteaux such as the Château of Ainay-le-Vieil, secrets gardens such as those of the Domain of Poulaines or the flower park in Apremont-sur-Allier, internationally known vineyards such as those in Sancerre, lively towns such as Bourges and nature reserves such as the Regional Nature Park of Brenne. This countryside area is a holiday destination in its own right and with treasures to discover.

To the north, there is a different ambiance. Enjoy a city break in **Chartres** with its cathedral listed as UNESCO World Heritage or discover the authentic but still little-known **Eure valley** with villages such as **Maintenon**, known for its château and unfinished aqueduct that was the fruit of a wild idea of Louis XIV.

La Scandibérique is the French section of EuroVelo 3 which goes from Trondheim in Norway to Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

Although the idea of traversing Europe from north to south was appealing, I couldn't take that much time off work so I decided to settle for a few days on the Paris-Tours section..

The route started by following the Seine to Fontainebleau and then joined the Loing. I was quite taken with the town of Montargis, nicknamed "the Venice of Gâtinais" with its 131 bridges and footbridges spanning a multitude of little rivers. After enjoying a few Praslines Mazet, the local speciality, I left the banks of the Loing and joined the Briare canal. The tow path was a pleasant ride and I had fun waving to the passengers on the canal boats that regularly passed by. I passed through typical little Loiret villages like Châtillon-Coligny before arriving in Briare.

The panoramic view of the Loire from the canal aqueduct there was breathtaking! Here, the Briare canal crosses over the Loire on a bridge built by Eiffel, creating two separate water courses like I've rarely seen before! I then headed due west along the banks of

At this point the route follows *La Loire à Vélo*, which I rode a few years ago, but I really enjoyed discovering it again. That evening, I decided to stop at the campsite in *Gien* after hearing good things about it from Paul, a cyclist I met the day before. I tried out their Abricyclo which means I didn't have to put up the tent. Luxury!

After the Château of Sully-sur-Loire, the first of the Loire châteaux on my route, I travelled through UNESCO World Heritage countryside and enjoyed taking in the spectacular scenery. I ticked off the stages: Orléans, Blois, Amboise, Tours; the surrounding landscape alternated vineyards, châteaux, forests and small villages... And so I arrived at the end of my journey, my mind and heart filled with happy memories of the experiences I enjoyed and the people I met.

I spent the last night at the youth hostel in **Tours**, The People Hostel, which reserves a special welcome for cyclists. There was a friendly atmosphere and I met Thomas and Hugo and we discussed our respective bike trips together. I'm already keen to go back!

was time for Christophe and I to discover this still relatively little-known part of France!

We arrived in the village of Meung-sur-Loire in the late afternoon. To better discover the Loire, the surrounding scenery and wildlife, we boarded a boat with Denis from the Coeur de Loire association. Denis was a true freshwater sailor and the trip was enjoyable and peaceful in the late-afternoon sun.

The next day, we headed to **Chambord**. There was no way we could miss out on this great architectural feat! And to think that the forest surrounding it is as big as the centre of Paris... It's huge! While waiting to visit the new permaculture vegetable garden and the vineyard surrounding the estate, Christophe got out his camera. It had to be said the location was picture-perfect!

That evening, we slept in a château! We spent a pleasant evening with Victor and Maria, the delightful Swiss owners of Le Manoir de Contres.

We were just a stone's throw from the Château of Cheverny, on which Hergé based his works "the adventures of Tintin". We discovered their new orchards, called the "sweet gardens", and enjoyed a trip on the river running through the park in an electric boat. The

At the **Domaine of Chaumont-sur-Loire**, we had lunch in the sunroom of the gastronomic restaurant «Le Grand Vélum». Our meals were decorated with flowers, which I found very refined. Unfortunately, the same can't be said of Christophe... Him and flowers! We went for a digestive stroll in the Domaine's vast park and admired the numerous works of art placed at different points within it. We ended the day at the International Garden Festival which, for its 30th edition, is on the theme of "biomimicry in the garden».

In the evening, we ate outside on the lawns of the Royal Château of Amboise. Held for the first time the year before, these evening picnics with a panoramic view are organised on certain days in summer and offer the opportunity to admire an exceptional sunset over the Loire accompanied by music.

On the last day we visited the iconic Renaissance gardens at Villandry. I admired the work of the gardeners who keep them perfectly maintained without using a single chemical!.

At the end of our trip, we headed west to the Vendée to visit our grandchildren. Next time they'll be coming with us, that's for sure!

To make the most of the end of summer, Paul and I treated ourselves to a romantic weekend away. As lovers of good wine and heritage, the Loire Valley has appealed to us for a long time and, after a little research, we decided to go to Chinon.

We began the weekend with a visit to the **Fortress of Chinon**, a must-see among the greatest sites in the Loire Valley! Using the **Histopad**, the visit was an entertaining one that plunged us into the history of the site. Outside, the panoramic view of the city and surrounding vineyards was stunning.

After a quick lunch in the *guinguette* (openair cafe) in Chinon, we set off for a rather unusual vineyard visit... it was time for a Segway ride through the vineyard at *Domaine Pierre & Bertrand Couly*! It's a great activity that allowed us to discover the vines in a fun way.

At the end of the day, another unusual experience awaited us. *Domaine de Noiré* organises gourmet tastings on the Vienne aboard a gabare boat. Our boatman served us a glass of the Domaine's wine and a few local products, including *poires tapées* from Rivarennes. It was a moment where time seemed to stand still at the end of our first

The following day, we headed off to **Cave de la Sybille**, just a few minutes' drive from Chinon, to discover the tale of Rabelais and the sybil. We were plunged straight into the story thanks to the unique scenography of the site and the sculptures on the tuffeau stone walls. The visit ended with a tasting of local wines in the shop.

Chinon wines are both light and full-bodied and dense as well as structured according to soil they were grown in. Paul particularly appreciated a Chinon Red with notes of spices aged in oak barrels, but I preferred a lighter wine with red fruit notes, perfect for a pre-dinner drink! We bought two bottles of each

To end the stay, we visited the gardens and **Château of Le Rivau**. We wandered among the roses, works of art and the vegetable in the kitchen garden. A second later, we had the pleasure of finding the same vegetable on our plates in the château's restaurant, the "Jardin Secret". We discovered that you can even book accommodation at the château!

At the end of our romantic weekend, we went home with stars in our eyes! www.chinon.com

Our hire bikes were delivered directly to the hotel for us with helmets and panniers. We didn't go for the **«luggage transfer»** option, although it is a very practical service offered by the hire company. With our panniers fastened and our helmets strapped on, it was time to go!!

We rode along the Loire with Jeanne in the trailer attached to Thomas's bike and Titouan on his shiny green one. After 10km, we stopped at *Pointe de Courpain* to admire the flocks of migratory birds. It was so calm and relaxing! A little later on, we stopped for a leisurely picnic lunch in *Meung-sur-Loire* before going into the château. The visit with Walter the robot was really well designed for children, ours didn't get bored for a second! It was nearly time for an afternoon snack, so we cycled off again in the direction of the *La Corne des Pâtures* open-air cafe. Everything was local and homemade, we loved it!

The next day, we continued our route towards **Saint-Dyé-sur-Loire** where we were to spend the night on a boat. We arrived at lunchtime and stopped at Le Bistrot Vélo, a cafe-bar that reserves a special welcome for cyclists!

The **Château of Chambord** was only 7 km away and, since we still had some energy left, we cycled there and back in the afternoon. It was very awe-inspiring arriving at Chambord by bike, it made us feel so tiny!

At the end of the day, we enjoyed a trip on the Loire in a **traditional boat**. Jean-Pierre was an enthusiastic guide and we learned plenty of things, even managing to spot a beaver!

On the last day, we arrived in **Blois** late morning, which left us enough time to visit the city, the Maison de la Magie, the Parc des Mées and the Loire Observatory. In the evening, we were all spellbound by the sound and light show in the courtyard of the **Royal Château of Blois!** 

Something tells me this won't be the last time our family does 65km by bike.... We're already thinking about our next holiday, and it will definitely be a cycling one!

An hour later, we arrived in Chartres. We followed Etienne who took us to a house surrounded by greenery with ducks and chickens, just 2km from the station. A spot of countryside in the city!

It was time for a drink, so we all trooped off to the La Petite Venise open-air cafe on the banks of the Eure to enjoy a couple of local beers. With its expanses of crop fields, the region around Chartres is known as "the grain store of France" and the number of craft breweries is exploding!

Night falls. We got back on our bikes to explore Chartres by night. Nico promised us we would be amazed, and we were not disappointed! Chartres en Lumières is an evening light show that illuminates all the buildings in the city centre, bringing them to life with an exceptional choreography.

The next day, we visited the Chartres cathedral first, which is listed as UNESCO World Heritage, then went to the market to buy provisions for lunch. Cheese from Perche, multigrain bread, a generous serving of pate route from Paris to Mont-Saint-Michel. We were 20km from Maintenon, where we stopped to visit the château. And what a château! It once belonged to Madame de Maintenon, Louis XIV's mistress. They even got married here in secret. The park was magnificent and we couldn't resist a quick break in the picnic area.

We left the Véloscénie and joined the vallev of the Eure for 6km until we reached our next destination; an unusual gite on the banks of the river. We enjoyed a great evening around the barbecue provided by the owners.

In the morning, 15km of cycling to the water sports centre in Mézières-Ecluzelles awaited us. Nico had planned a canoe trip on the Eure for 2hrs30mins and I was keen to give it a try! The valley of the Eure is very peaceful, bordered by attractive houses and the journey was easy and relaxing.

After returning to the water sports centre, we continued our route for 6km to the train station at **Dreux**, the final stop of our mini adventure. In less than an hour we were back in Paris, both relaxed and excited!

We started in the village of Apremont-sur-Allier which is listed as one of the Most Beautiful Villages in France. We walked through the guiet streets and along the banks of the Allier then visited the flower garden. A real gem! With its oriental-style pavilions and bridges, it soon transported us to the far-off lands of the Byzantine Empire and China..

We continued our journey to Sancerre to discover a real treasure: the Pesselières gardens which are traversed by a stream and boast an alley of three-hundred-year-old boxwood trees as well as a maze and a vegetable garden. We made the most of this haven of peace..

After a relaxing night in Sancerre, we visited the gardens and arboretum at the Domain of Poulaines. Valerie, the owner, explained that she also had gites in the garden and sold local produce in the tearoom and hand-crafted items in the shop, such as hats made of stinging nettles. Since it was sunny, I treated myself to one and barely took it off for the rest of the holiday!

The Château of Bouges, 10 minutes away, reminded us of the Petit Trianon at Versailles. vear.

As a keen admirer of George Sand, I was interested to discover the Domain of Nohant. The writer spent part of her childhood here and later received the great artists of the time at the domain, including Eugène Delacroix, Franz Listz, Alfred de Musset and her lover, Frédéric Chopin. The visit of the house and gardens was filled with tales about the life of this strong-willed woman!

After this literary break, we went to the medieval gardens at the Prieuré d'Orsan, carefully maintained by the new owners, Cyril and Gareth, where we travelled back in time. We had lunch in the middle of the gardens with a view of a fantastic topiary heart against an old stone wall. The location is imbued with a sense of calm and serenity!

We slept in the Château of Ainay-le-Vieil and visited the gardens in the early morning. Even in July the rose garden was still stunning and the roses perfumed the park while the morning sun added an intimate feel to the location.

We then went to the Le Blanc outdoor activity centre where we had reserved 4 mountain bikes. It's the best way to travel to explore Brenne at your own pace. We stopped to admire several lakes and watch the flocks of birds from the observation huts. After a good bike ride, we headed for our gite for the night.

## Tours is being transformed!

## Arbore et Sens, new gastronomy

Behind this gastronomic restaurant is, above all, the tale of a family adventure. After travelling in different countries across the world, chef Clément Guillot finally returned to his homeland to open his own restaurant at the foot of the Royal City of Loches. 
